
The three categories of partners (*interested parties*, also called *stakeholders*), whose views need to be harmonized by consensus in standardization under the "New Approach"



- Each provision of a standard is the result of the consensus obtained, after due discussion at each stage of the elaboration of this standard, by the members of the working group in charge of this elaboration.
- In the <u>general product standardization process</u> (e.g. dimensional standardization of mechanical components), only two *interested parties* need to be represented in the working group: the *manufacturer* (or *designer*) and the *users* of the product.
- For <u>standards prepared under the New Approach</u>, which need to provide the users with the highest possible level of safety according to the state of the art, a third party needs to be involved in the discussion aimed at reaching consensus: the *health-and-safety experts*, who may be:
 - collaborators of research institutes,
 - representatives of the Public Authorities in charge of health-and-safety legislation and
 - collaborators of testing and certification bodies, who "feed" the discussion with their practical knowledge of the products (machinery, personal protective equipment, etc.).
